Careers and Employability

A comprehensive Careers Education programme is provided for all students starting in Year 8 with Education for Employability.

Class work, access to information technology sources, visits, conventions, speakers, practical experience and the involvement of the Careers Officer from the Department of Employment and Learning are used in the provision of this programme. Students have the opportunity to be involved with Young Enterprise to help develop business and entrepreneurial skills as well as key interview and presentational skills.

All students in Years 10 to 14 are involved in Personal Career Planning. This is a process which enables young people to make informed decisions in relation to career development and to act on these decisions.

Work Experience and work shadowing are available for all students in Years 11, 12, 13 & 14. Small group work is used for guidance and monitoring.

Pastoral Care

The Pastoral Care of the individual student is of paramount concern to us. At St Malachy's we aim to promote the physical, academic, social, moral and spiritual development of all our students and in doing so bring about self-discipline to help each student grow and develop into mature, well rounded individuals fully equipped to take their place in society.

Our staff seek to support each student individually and to develop their talents. Each student is at the core of what we are about as an educational community. A special induction programme for Year 8 students has been designed to assist with settling the students quickly and easily to become a valued member of our school community. Specially trained Sixth Form Mentors make a significant contribution to this induction programme.

Special Educational Needs

St Malachy's High School caters for students with a wide range of Special Educational Needs and we make all reasonable attempts to cater for the needs of any student who wishes to enrol with us. Whilst students with SEN are the shared responsibility for all staff, their provision is managed and co-ordinated by the Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCo).

There are students with SEN in every year group and every class in the school, from those with Learning Difficulties in our Learning Support Centre to those studying for four 'A' Level examinations

Students with statements in mainstream are placed in classes according to their individual ability levels. They have access to classroom assistant support; internal literacy and numeracy support and external outreach support from a range of different service providers. All students are encouraged to reach their own individual potential and, with appropriate careers guidance, the majority progress to further and higher education.

Students who have been identified with SEN (but do not have SEN statements) have access to our internal support

structures. These include students with Specific Literacy and Numeracy Difficulties, Sensory Impairments, Emotional Difficulties, Medical conditions etc.

We also aim to provide a high level of support for parents/ guardians of our students as we believe that their success relies on the partnership that exists between home and school. All our students are treated as individuals and every effort is made to meet their needs in a caring, supportive learning and teaching environment.

Students with statements of SEN may be taught either in our Learning Support Centre or in mainstream, depending on the nature of their individual educational need.

Learning Support Centre

The Learning Support Centre caters for statemented students with a range of difficulties in years 8 to 12. These students enjoy small teaching group settings and the Learning Support Centre is staffed by specialist teachers who are supported by a team of classroom assistants. In line with our school's policy for inclusion, these students attend The LSC for up to 50% of their timetable and are integrated with their mainstream classes for the remaining time. In collaboration with parents and teachers all LSC students in year 10 will be supported to carefully select the Key Stage 4 pathway most suited to their particular strengths and interests, from a wide range of GCSE subjects as well as more vocational pathways.

Withdrawal Groups

Students in Years 8, 9 and 10 who have been identified as needing help with literacy or numeracy skills are withdrawn for extra support. This is done on the basis of prioritised need.

School Uniform / Appearance

All students at St.Malachy's are required to wear the school uniform at all times during the school day when travelling to and from school and to be neat and tidy in appearance. Our uniform creates a community identity and encourages our students to take pride in themselves and in their school.

- Ties must be knotted and worn outside the shirt
- Collars buttoned
- Shirts and blouses tucked in
- Skirts knee length (short skirts will not be tolerated)
- · No jewellery other than a watch is permitted
- No earrings, no facial studs or body piercings (including tongue piercings) are permitted

- No make-up allowed in Years 8 & 9. Light foundation and concealer is permitted in Years 10-14. No eye make-up or false eyelashes permitted in any year group.

The final decision with regards to all of the above rests with the Senior Leadership Team. Parents are asked to co-operate with the school in this regard.

Charging Policy

The Board of Governors of St Malachy's High School is required by Education Reform (NI) Order 1989 to draw up a charging policy and remission policy. It is the policy of the Board of Governors:

- To levy a charge for all board and lodging costs on residential visits except where students are entitled to statutory remission;
- To levy a charge for all activities wholly or mainly outside school hours which are not part of the Northern Ireland Curriculum, statutory religious education or in preparation for a prescribed public examination;

- To levy no charge for examination entries except as indicated in the Schools Examination Entry Policy in the School Management Plan;
- To provide without charge the essential materials required by the Northern Ireland Curriculum to prepare for prescribed public examinations;
- To levy a charge for damage to the school building and/or contents or loss of school materials whether accidental or otherwise.

The restrictions on charging for school activities do not in any way prevent the Board of Governors from seeking voluntary contributions in support of any school activities whether during or outside school hours, residential or non-residential.

In some cases, parents may also be informed that an activity is dependent on voluntary contributions, i.e. cannot be funded without such contributions.

This charging policy only relates to charges which may be made by the Governors or the Education and Library Board, and does not relate to any educational activity where charges are levied by a third party.

Assessment / Reporting To Parents

St Malachy's High School has developed a structured programme of internal assessment. This involves continuous monitoring through a tracking system and formal assessment.

This enables teachers, through a philosophy of assessment for learning, to use the data collected to inform lesson planning and to prepare relevant resources tailored to meet the needs of the students.

Regular assessment facilitates the monitoring of the progress of each individual student.

Parents and students are made aware of:

- · what is expected of the students;
- how students can achieve those expectations;
- and how students can contribute to assessment procedures.

Internal Examinations

The assessment cycle includes:

All year groups

Continuous Assessment using a common assessment framework. Formal assessments are carried out in December and June.

Reports

Written reports are produced annually for each student throughout the academic year. With midterm progress updates for all students. Reports are produced in November, January and June.

External Examinations

It is school policy that all Year 11 and 12 students are prepared for GCSE examinations.

Year 13 students are entered for AS, GCE and Level 3 courses.

Year 14 students undertake GCE 'A' level/Level 3 courses. External examinations are held in May and June of each year for GCSE, AS and A2 students. There is also a series of modular examinations throughout the academic year.

Parent Teacher Meetings

Throughout each academic year, parents are provided with the opportunity to discuss their child's progress with subject teachers. Parent/ Teacher Meetings are arranged for all year groups. Attendance at these meetings is of benefit to parents, students and staff.

Visiting the School

Working in partnership with parents and guardians is valued at St Malachy's High School. Those who are considering sending their child to the school may visit during the annual Open Day.

Appointments can be made through the main office should a parent/guardian wish to arrange an individual interview to discuss their child's progress, at any time throughout the academic year.





Sport

Extra-Curricular Activities

Whatever the student's desire for sport, we aim to deliver a curriculum that will encourage an active lifestyle and participation in sport and exercise long after they leave school. Students are given opportunities to participate in a wide variety of activities in curriculum time and are actively encouraged to engage with the extensive and successful extracurricular programme.

Students can experience a selection of the following activities: aerobics, athletics, badminton, basketball, camogie, crosscountry, dance, Gaelic football (male and female), gymnastics, handball, health and fitness, hurling, in-door hockey, netball, orienteering, soccer, softball, table-tennis and volleyball.

Castlewellan and Tollymore Forest Parks are used for an extensive range of outdoor activities.











Art & Design

Extra-Curricular Activities

The Art and Design department in St Malachy's High school enhances the creative and artistic experiences of students through its after schools club. Students are encouraged to participate in workshops that develop their expertise in textiles, ceramics, painting and drawing techniques.

Trips are arranged to galleries and exhibitions. The Art and Design club actively engages with local community projects in producing creative works that are displayed both in school and the wider community.

Music

Extra-Curricular Activities

St Malachy's High School students have access to a broad and varied extra-curricular music programme. Tuition is available on a weekly basis by highly qualified tutors on the following instruments:

Students have the opportunity to take graded examinations on the instrument and are encouraged to do so. The success rate is commendable with most students obtaining either a Merit or Distinction. Success at Grade 6 practical or theory offers students UCAS points which are recognised by Universities.



The school has an Irish Traditional group, a Chamber Choir and the School Choir. These groups meet in the mornings before school, during lunchtime and after school as required. Students are involved throughout the year in composition and recording workshops.

Individual students/groups perform in school at various events, these include; Assemblies, School Masses, Junior and Senior Prize Nights, Open Days, Spring Concerts and music throughout the year for the elderly.

Theory of Music lessons are available during the year. They prove invaluable to students who play an instrument or students who choose to study music for GCSE or AS/A2 level.

Drama

Extra-Curricular Activities

Drama is an integral part of the fabric of St Malachy's High School and is fundamental in the development of students' self esteem and confidence.

Over the years students have availed of various dramatic opportunities such as participation in 'The Sound of Music', 'My Fair Lady', 'Annie' and 'School of Rock'. Students need not study Drama as part of their timetable in order to enjoy the benefits as there is a weekly Drama Club where students can learn dramatic skills and develop techniques. In previous years we have entered competitions and feiseanna; we have produced and recorded our own films and won various awards.

Trips to Local Theatres are organised throughout the year as well as to the famous West - End in London. Drama facilitators

and practitioners are invited to enhance the drama students learning. Extra curricular Drama is available to every student in our school regardless of academic ability or age.

Drama is a key subject and extra-curricular activity for students to get involved with. It is encouraged at St Malachy's for students to develop their confidence, communication skills and ability to express themselves with self-assurance. Studying and taking part in Drama can help with acting and performance skills, but also key life skills such as organisation, presentation skills, leadership as well as vocal clarity and articulation.

A pupil may be accepted into the school provided this would not prejudice, in the opinion of the Governors, the efficient use of the school's resources and that the school is in a position to provide a curriculum appropriate to the applicant's needs.

The pupil's previous school report, attendance, work record and behaviour will be considered and admission will be dependent on a favourable report.

If at the time of the consideration of the application, there are more eligible applicants than places in a particular year group available, then the admission criteria to Year 8 will be applied to select pupils to fill available places.

Saint Malachy's does not operate a waiting list for pupils who apply for a place to any year group and are unsuccessful. Each application is decided upon at the time of receipt.

Irish Medium Education

St Malachy's High school is thriving and continues to grow at a rapid rate. There has been a huge growth from the 5 students who started the IME stream in 2011, to 150. Students have transferred from four local feeder bunscoileanna; Bunscoil Mhuire agus Phádraig, Bunscoil Bheanna Boirche and Bunscoil an Iúir.

As the IME stream grows in number, so too does our curriculum provision through the medium of Irish. Students study up to 50% of their Key Stage 3 subjects through Irish and we now have developed into Key Stage 4 (GCSE).

This rapidly growing IME stream is bringing with it tremendous success with students achieving outstanding GCSE and A level results. These students are a credit to their parents, bunscoileanna and St. Malachy's High School.

The IME vision in St Malachy's High School is one where students receive a well-rounded, high-quality education in a bilingual setting where their learning needs are supported and challenged so that they can reach their full potential. Our students are given the educational opportunity to become skilful individuals, making a positive and effective contribution to the local and wider community.

We actively enter a vast range of extra-curricular activities and competitions from Feis an Dúin, 'Gael Linn Abair' to attending the Irish social media day hosted in the Facebook offices in Dublin. Indeed, a number of IME students, along with 30 other IME students from the other 5 IME secondary schools in the North, were recently afforded the opportunity to travel to Brussels and explore the opportunities for Irish speakers abroad.

This fantastic opportunity enabled our IME students to visit the European Parliament and indeed to take part in a discussion in a European conference room as Gaeilge. Listening to these students interact with others in Irish on the streets of Leuven was uplifting and a testament to these gifted and confident students.

A large number of Irish Medium Students take a lead role in music, drama and sport in St. Malachy's High School, underpinning the versatility of students in bilingual education settings.

We have strong links with the other IME Second level providers and are actively part of various initiatives to further enhance and ensure the highest level of educational opportunities for our Irish Medium Students.

Digital Schoolhouse

St Malachy's High School's Digital Schoolhouse, uses playbased learning to engage the next generation of pupils with the Computing curriculum. The Digital Schoolhouse in St Malachys uniquely combines computing, fun, creativity, innovation, and industry expertise and brings them into our classroom

The computing workshops are aimed at our local primary schools around the Castlewellan area. The P6 and P7 pupils can experience our unique approach to play-based learning through innovative, fun activitie.. With groundbreaking careers education, the programme also successfully bridges the gap between education and industry

Each week one of our local primary schools will visit the school, having made a booking through our Digital Schoolhouse website. The students learn about problem solving strategies through computational thinking. They learn about the importance of algorithms which not only are valuable in the study of computer science, but also in other curriculum areas. Student s are also taught about various pieces of hardware used to make a computer system.
